## Sample Metrics for Evaluating Complete Streets:

- Increase in the share of bicycles, pedestrians and transit users;
- Traffic Speed
- Crash data
  - o Car to car
  - Car to bike
  - Car to pedestrian
  - o Bike to bike
  - Bike to pedestrian



- Traffic Volume:
  - # of cars/bikes/pedestrians on street
  - Vehicle Turning Counts (intersections)
- Use of new projects by mode;
- Compliments and complaints;
- Linear feet of pedestrian accommodations built;
- Number of ADA accommodations built;
- Miles of bike lanes/trails built or striped;
- Number of transit accessibility accommodations built;
- Number of street trees planted;
- Number of building permits issued along new complete street;
- Number of exemptions from complete streets policy.
- Sales tax receipts from businesses adjacent to complete streets projects
- Number of visitors in local establishments
- Number of seated pedestrians affronting businesses abutting complete street improvements
- Number of vacant storefronts
- Asthma Rates
- Obesity Rates
- Perceptions of Safety
- Crime rate
- Air quality
- Water Quality
